President's Letter

Hello Everyone,

I hope you all found the special May edition about the National Register of Historic Places

interesting and informative. Our great thanks to Reinhard Wohlgemuth, Gazette editor, for getting the article from Preservation magazine to fit into our small space. Last evening, a good number of EPHS members and Phillipsdale homeowners were on hand for the first workshop concerning the proposed Phillipsdale Mill Village District which would be listed on the above mentioned National Register. The research done by Cathy Cavenaugh, preservation consultant, was in depth and there were maps and photos (some provided by EPHS archives) from 1830 through the consultant's photos of buildings in their present day condition. It was a convincing and well documented presentation in favor of a NR nomination.

Rick Greewood of the RI Historic Commission also offered information about historic districts, making the distinction between a national district and a local district. The first places no restrictions on a homeowner and the latter requires a homeowner to check in with a local commission before making changes to the exterior of a building. There are tax credits available within a national district also. Mr. Greenwood also said that the state had reviewed and recommended the district for federal review and on July 13 the Department of the Interior would be considering the nomination. Any homeowners in the proposed district who oppose the nomination must send written, notarized letters to the state historic commission before that time as 50% of the homeowners in a proposed district must be in favor of the new designation. In this case, any homeowner not replying in opposition to is considered to be in favor of the district. All homeowners in the district had received prior information about the matter and many had brought their notification with them last evening. Thank you to all the EPHS members/ homeowners in the district for supporting the nomination.

Fish Ladder Update

Patrick Hanner, senior planner with the City and overseer of work done at Hunts Mills, has provided us with an update of work as of mid-Mau. If you have visited Hunts Mills, you will notice that the large equipment is pretty much gone and the fish ladder has been backfilled. Much needs to be done as far as relandscaping but the ladder is in place. We have included the updates for the other fish ladders for those of you who have been following their progress.

Dot Thornley was kind enough to provide us with some of her latest Hunt's Mills pictures from June 9 to add to this article...

Hunts Dam

The fish ladder is approximately 80% complete with concrete form work/placement ongoing. We were slightly delayed (1 month) by the discovery that the dimensions of the historic intake

structure below ground surface were not as assumed and encroached on the footprint of the fish ladder. We worked closely with the RI and US Fish & Wildlife offices to adjust the dimensions of fish ladder to avoid the intake structure while maintaining the ladder's functionality. Work at Hunts should be substantially complete by June/July time frame.

Turner Reservoir

Seepage issues identified during initial dewatering of the cofferdam area forced us to reconsider our approach and renegotiate with our contractor. A modification to Rocchio Corporation's contract will be issued very soon to allow them to install additional sheeting around the cofferdam and along the concrete spillway to maintain the integrity of the City-owned dam and ensure work can commence under dry conditions. Rocchio Corp will probably

remobilize in June and begin the sheeting install. The environmental permit for Turner permits the contractor to lower the Turner Reservoir starting July 1st. That is when I expect the contractor to complete the cofferdam system and begin construction of the fish ladder foundation. Construction at Turner will continue into the fall and should be substantially complete in the November/ December time frame.

Omega Pond Dam

This particular project is very complex - the proposed fish ladder for Omega passes under an active railroad and a 115 kV high voltage overhead wire. The foundation for the ladder passes through an existing 16-inch high pressure gas main and must be constructed in river sediments contaminated with arsenic and lead. The proposed staging area is a former Brownfield site. Access to the site required 7 legal agreements with several entities - RIDOT, RIDEM. Providence & Worcester RR, Citu of East Providence, Phillipsdale Landing – in addition to our cooperation agreements with RIDEM. Plans and Specifications are under Independent Technical Review (ITR) and Buildability, Constructability, Operability & Environmental (BCOE) Review this week and should be readu to advertise by the end of Mau/earlu Iune. Award is expected in July 2011; construction will begin in August and will likely be completed in the spring 2012.

Gardening Tips

Taller lawn grasses have deeper roots and can better handle droughts during the hot weather. Keep mower blades sharp and set wheels at the highest level, leaving 3" of grass after mowing. Allow the clippings to break down on the lawn and replenish the nutrients naturally.

Plant a row of beans, beets, lettuce, radish and spinach every 10 days to 2 weeks for a bounty all season long. Other crops to plant during mid-summer for the fall are, broccoli, cauliflower, carrots and cabbage. Blanching

and freezing will allow you to enjoy your own veggies all year long!

Reduce leaf diseases on roses and tomatoes by watering only in the morning and watering the soil and not the plant's leaves.

Fertilize your roses after blooming to increase a second bloom and increase the vigor of the plant.

Move household plants outdoors for the summer. To acclimate them to the stronger light, first start them in shade. Arrange them in spots that match their light when indoors. Wash leaves with a mild soap if they have become dusty over the winter. A

"hair cut" may also be in order, as well as repotting if necessary.

Attract hummingbirds with bee balm, columbine, lupine, penstamon and hanging fuchsias.
