Well, we weathered the weather this summer and hasn't the end of August been splendid!

Life at Hunt House has been quiet but we held our open houses and un-open houses (those days when someone was on site and people just seemed to rise up out of the earth). Many thanks to the Museum/Curation and Master Gardener crews for manning the site and welcoming callers so warmly.

If you are in the area of Hunts Mills, come down to see the changes around the house. The topsoil has been graded and seeded in the fish ladder area and, once all that is well established, the chain link fence will come down, leaving a split rail fence to mark the river's edge. The look of the ladder from the road is quite unobtrusive and the Board is very pleased with the masonry work in the end of the old foundation.

Behind Hunt House there are major changes as the backhoes

and earth movers have been working to clear the site of the old amusement park. A venerable oak still marks the site of the carousel and some trees surround the root cellar, but the site will become a mowed lawn with paths, seating and interpretive signs (See photo on back page). Beyond this grassy space, the wooded area will be selectively cleared to the entrance road so the vista, while not being a view to the river as it was in 1920, will have long sightlines from the Hunt House and the gazebo. Hunt House will stand out very proudly in this new setting and the spring picnic will be a grand time to explore this new space.

If the summer was leisurely, the pace has picked up markedly these past two weeks. We have welcomed curation intern Kristina Calia, agreed to be open for the Smithsonian sponsored Free Museum Day on Saturday September 24, are coordinating a traveling Smithsonian – type exhibit for Weaver Library for our members' meeting on September 26, and have exciting plans for our participation in Watchemoket Square Day on

October 29. Please look for further details about these events in the Gazette and let us know how you wish to help make each day a success.

# **Gardening Tips**

- ✓ September is the best month to start grass seed. Resow barren areas or redo a lawn section without the worry of weeds to interfere with germination.
- ✓ Transplanting in the fall also gets plants off to a cooler start.
- ✓ Garden centers mark down perennials and you can get a good deal. Check for bugs, root bound pots, or dried or diseased plants. You can sometimes divide pots into several plants from one plant, thus getting an even better deal!
- ✓ Check trees for severe wind damage. Broken branches are one thing, but severe cracks in the trunk are a sign that the tree will die and you should have a licensed arborist evaluate your trees for potential loss.
- ✓ Stop fertilizing perennials and focus on blooms through the remainder of the season. Deadhead roses!
- ✓ Freeze excess tomatoes and peppers without cooking or blanching! Simply clean and dry the fruit or vegetable (Ha. Ha), place in a ziplock bag, and place it in the freezer.
- ✓ Enjoy tender vegetables before the frost. Cover with a blanket or sheet if temps are predicted to be below 40°

## **Carousel Center**

Part of the city's restoration of the Hunts Mills area is the partial clearing of the old amusement park. After the trees were cleared they marked the original carousel location with a ring of curb stones.
