Smithsonian Day: Saturday Sept 28th - 11:00am-1:00pm and 1:00-3:00pm Hunt House (in and out)


Watchemoket Square Day: Saturday, October 19th – 10:00–12:00am and 12:00–3:00pm Tockwotten foyer

Gardening Tips

Bring houseplants back indoors when nighttime temperatures dip into the low 40s. Check your plants for aphids, whiteflies and spider mites before bringing them inside.

Enliven garden prime spots and faded planters with Mum's and asters for nice fall color!

Fall is a great time to divide spring flowering perennials and also rejuvenate sad looking lawns. Fewer weeds will crowd out grasses at this time of year, so your lawn will look better than if you seed it in the spring.

Continue to deadhead your flowers and be prepared to cover them with a sheet or floating row cover to extend their season as temperatures dip below 40° at night. You will be rewarded with an Indian summer show!!! This also works for

tomatoes, peppers and basil which can be burned by cold nighttime temperatures.

We have tried broiling our excess eggplant, summer squash and green beans for freezing and storing during the winter. Prepare a dressing with olive oil, garlic and herbs to dip the sliced vegetables into before laying on a sheet pan and lightly broiling.

Once cooled, place in freezer bags and store in your freezer for "almost fresh" vegetables during the winter.

Tomatoes and raspberries can be frozen, uncooked, by laying them on a sheet pan and placing them in the freezer. Once frozen they can be placed in freezer bags for use during the winter. They will be mushy but will add freshness to your soup or oatmeal!
