## President's letter

Hello Everyone,

On Friday, April 30th, we postmarked a grant request to the Champlin Foundation asking

that they consider matching the \$25,000 we have remaining in the beguest we received last fall. Edna Anness, Margaret Dooley and I worked on this grant over the week and we hope it will interest Champlin with whom we have a twenty year history. (In 1989, they gave us \$91,000 to begin restoration of the Hunt House.) The Hunt House (now museum) has need of many of those things that any house needs after twenty years. Edna has a little wish list of her own. We will go ahead with exterior work as the Building Committee determines the priorities as to how our present monies can best be used. Come November. we hope that we will have some good news from Champlin.

Those who attended the April 26th members meeting where Park Ranger John McNiff was a "no show" will be relieved to hear that he is well but that his

father died unexpectedly that Monday morning. He left town without giving any thought to that day's appointments. He returned this week full of apology for standing us up and hoping that we will engage him for next fall. We will, of course.

For those of us working on having a field trip meeting at the Star Diner, Newport Avenue, there is sad news that the diner is closed due to family health reasons with no mention of a reopening date. The community has embraced the recently opened, restored diner and we hope the closing will be short and the family restored to health also.

The photos in this issue (back page) show the Newman Church spire octagonal base which now resides in the Pump House at Hunts Mills. It is massive in design and did its job well for 200 years. Powder post beetles did it in, however, and a steel framing has taken its place. With treatment for infestation (already done) it will remain an amazing reminder of sturdy post and beam framing. We're very pleased that the issues

surrounding the tower use as a satellite space and the old framing were resolved through meetings with the East Providence Historical Society, the East Providence Historic District Commission, Newman Church and the cell company.

At our April 26th members meeting, some members expressed concern about the parking situation at East Bay Manor, Wampanoag Trail, site of our May 24th members meeting. This week, I met with Sue Spiro who makes all group arrangements. She assures me that there are about 10 spaces at the entrance of the main building and at least 12 spaces in an adjacent parking lot. of the lighthouse as the restoration took place beginning with pictures of the lighthouse in 1975 when it was owned and maintained by the United States Coast Guard. The



## **Museum News**


Edna Anness, Curator

The 'Red Hat Ladies' from Cumberland will be touring the museum on Tuesday, May 18th.

We have also had inquiries about the Walker House, the Union School, the Old Red Bridge and "Robert the Hermit" who lived in a cave below Fort Hill between 1800 and 1820. By the way, we have in storage the sign from the Old Red Bridge. We also now have the interior support piece from the original steeple at Newman Church. It is very special. Post and beam constructed.

## Gardening Tips



Set your lawn mower on the highest setting to prevent crabgrass and other weeds from germinating. Most homeoners have their mower setting too low and cause grass stress. Taller grass will give you a

greener thicker lawn without chemicals and deeper roots to weather droughts during the summer.

Create a perennial (plants living more than 2 years) bed to reduce the lawn area in your yard. Perennials offer more diversity, habitat and ease of yard maintenance. Choose lillies, Perovskia (Russian sage), coreopsis or echinacea (cone flowers), which make a great tea!

Weeding is the most important task this month. Pulling the weeds before they set their seeds will reduce the number of weeds in the future.

Cover planting beds with 2 - 3" of mulch to prevent weeds from germinating. This will also retain water and nutrients for the plant.

Stake perennials like delphinium and peonies before they grow too tall. Hoops, half circles and individual stakes work best. Plant most tender vegetable crops by month's end.
