




### "ALL QUIET ON THE RAPPAHANOCK TONIGHT"


### "Riverside's Historic Shore Resorts and Hotels"

## 1<sup>st</sup> Lt Thomas J Tubman

This year, 2020, marks the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the end of WWII.

It also marks a personal anniversary for my family, the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of my uncle, 1<sup>st</sup> Lt Thomas J Tubman's death.

Thomas was born in Providence, RI, January 28, 1921 to Irish immigrants Thomas and Mary (Neary) Tubman. The family moved to Riverside shortly after his birth to be closer to Standard Oil where my grandfather worked. They welcomed Edward (Ned) in 1923 and Robert (Bob) in 1924. Tragedy struck the family in 1930 when Thomas, Sr died from a massive heart attack.

At the young age of 7, Thomas, Jr found himself the 'man of the family'; a roll he would take seriously until his death.

He attended East Providence High School as part of the class of 1939. But life had other plans. He left EPHS to work at Quonset Naval Air Station to help support his mother and 2 younger brothers. It is believed that at some point he joined the Civilian Conservation Corp (CCC). He enlisted in the Army Air Corp in 1942 and was commissioned at Stuttgart Army Airfield Arkansas in April 1944. Upon completion of his training as a B-17 pilot he was sent to Celone Army Air Base, Foggia, Italy in December, 1944 where he was part of the 773<sup>rd</sup> Bombardment Squadron (Heavy), 463rd Bomb Group, 5th Bombardment Wing (Heavy), 15<sup>th</sup> USAAF. Thomas guickly rose to the rank of 1st Lieutenant and from copilot to pilot.

On March 24, 1945, 28 bombers were dispatched from Celone Air Base with 3 extras to cover should any of the originally dispatched bombers have to turn back because of mechanical problems. Lt Tubman piloted the B-17 Heavy, 44-6283, 'Betty Lou' as an extra but was moved to the Baker 5 position. The specific target was the Daimler-Benz tank assembly plant, which produced armored vehicles in Berlin.

The March 24, 1945 mission to Berlin was important historically for several reasons. It was the first Fifteenth Air Force mission to the German capital and the longest Fifteenth Air Force mission of the war. It was a mission in which Fifteenth Air Force fighters shot down more German jet ME-262 airplanes than any other day. Although the mission occurred in the closing months of the war, destruction of facilities at the Daimler-Benz tank works contributed to the Allied advance, depriving the Germans of some of the tanks they needed to defend the capital.



#### During that mission, Lt Tubman's

plane was hit by 4 ME-262's over Brux, Germany. According to an eyewitness, "Just previous to leaving the flak area at Brux, Baker 5, ship 283 dropped out of formation. It lost altitude steadily but seemed under control." According to the last crew member to exit the plane, "Lt Tubman gave the order to bail out after the plane had been severely damaged and set afire. He then remained at his post to keep the plane level while crewmen gave first aid to the bombardier who had been wounded. The crew then began leaving the plane. Immediately after I bailed out the plane exploded. Lt Tubman didn't have time to get out."

On March 26, 1945, the crew of the B-17, Betty Lou were listed as MIA. Later the status of 8 of the 10 crew members was updated as POW's. According to Army Air Corp records, the wreckage of the aircraft was later found in Germany with the two MIA crew members. At the wish of his mother, 1<sup>st</sup> Lt Tubman was buried in the American Battle Monument Cemetery in Ardennes, Belgium. The bombardier, Staff Sgt June Herman's remains were returned to his family in NY.

1<sup>st</sup> Lt Tubman was awarded posthumously the Purple Heart, the Silver Star, the Medal of Valor, the US Aviator Badge, WWII Victory Medal, American Campaign Medal, Army Presidential Unit Citation, Army Good Conduct Medal, European-African-Middle Eastern Campaign, and the Distinguished Service Cross.

Lt Tubman's Medal of Valor citation reads:

The President of the United States of America, authorized by Act of Congress, July 9, 1918, takes pride in presenting the Distinguished Service Cross (Posthumously) to First Lieutenant (Air Corps) Thomas John Tubman (ASN: 0-827994), United States Army Air Forces were interned at the, for extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy while serving as Pilot of a B-17 Heavy Bomber in the 773d Bombardment Squadron, 463d Bombardment Group (H), FIFTEENTH Air Force, while participating in a bombing mission on 24 March 1945, against enemy targets in the European Theater of Operations. On that date, during a combat mission to Berlin, Germany, Lieutenant Tubman skillfully maneuvered his burning aircraft in level flight in order that his crew might escape. In delaying his departure from the flaming airplane until first aid had been given to a wounded crew member, Lieutenant Tubman sacrificed his own chance for safety and was killed when the aircraft exploded. The technical skill, superior leadership, and heroic conduct displayed by Lieutenant Tubman on this occasion, at the cost of his life, have upheld the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, the 15<sup>th</sup> Air Force, and the United States Army Air Forces.

My Grandmother, Mary Tubman Beals, an Irish immigrant who gave her first born to her adopted country, was a proud and active member of the Gold Star Mothers of Riverside.

Although, Covid-19 canceled our trip to Brussels to pay our respect on the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of our Uncle Tom's death, my two brothers, my sister and I, along with our spouses were able to visit his grave in April, 2018. The superintendent of the cemetery conducted a graveside

service for us, one my Grandmother was never able to have. It was by far one of the most moving moments I have experienced. He rubbed sand from Normandy beach (used because many of those buried in this cemetery had entered Europe via the shores of Normandy) on the headstone which made the lettering stand out. He presented a small flag to my oldest brother Thomas (named in memory of our uncle) in appreciation for Thomas' "honorable and faithful service".

If you are ever able to visit one of these American Battle Monument Cemeteries the extent of the loss of young American lives is overwhelming and extremely moving.

## Fall Gardening Tips

- Look around your property and others you admire your fall flowering and colorful foliage, especially on grasses and maples. Garden centers mark down inventory at this time of year, and you can plant all through November. Continue watering until the ground freezes. At 50% off, you may want to buy extras! Check the roots, if possible, by removing the plant from its pot and be sure the plant is not completely root bound! Ask for a one-year guarantee, which most stores will offer.
- If possible, leave some areas of your yard covered with leaves and debris for overwintering pollinators.
- Fall is a good time to apply lime to your lawn. Generally the rate is 50 pounds per 1000 ft.<sup>2</sup>
- Onions and garlic store best in a mesh bag for good air circulation.
- Clip Holly and other evergreens for free holiday decorations!

• Garden ground cover crops such as peas, oats or annual rye grass help reduce weeds, add nitrogen to the soil and give barren garden beds a beautiful fresh look.
