# **Gardening Tips**

- Bring houseplants outdoors on a warm day and hose or gently wash off winter's dust. Refresh and re-pot into a slightly larger pot if needed. A liquid fertilizer might help stimulate growth and begin watering more as daylight grows longer. Test for dryness and water thoroughly as needed.
- Older packages of seeds usually maintain a 90% germination rate.
   We will have some free seeds at our open houses this spring.
- A method to test for germination of seeds is to place a few seeds on a paper towel, wet the paper towel and seal it in a Ziploc bag. Keep the seeds warm for a few days and observe them. Once sprouted, transplant with tweezers into small pots filled with potting soil and give adequate light and water as needed. Young seedlings are very susceptible to environment conditions. They can easily die if they become too wet or too dry. Read the seed packet to learn when it is safe to transplant them outdoors.
- Many varieties of leafy greens can now be directly planted into your garden. Read each package!
- I would caution gardeners who are starting seeds indoors at home to keep their seedlings in a sunny window, rotate the plants for strong stem growth, and maintain an even watering. This way, they will be ready to transplant in May after the last chance of frost.



# Pomham Rocks Celebrates its 150<sup>th</sup>


Pomham Rocks Lighthouse. 150 years ago, on December 1<sup>st</sup>, 1871, Pomham Rocks Lighthouse began its mission of guiding shipping along the Providence River with its steadfast red beacon. In 150 years, the Lighthouse has seen its share of changing technology in the

ships and boats that pass by and rely on the Lighthouse's beacon. From wooden sailing ships and steam powered paddle wheelers to reciprocating steam engine powered ships to the diesel, steam turbine or gas turbine powered ships of today. The Lighthouse has seen the World War Two liberty ships built in Providence and Cranston sailing by to ioin the war effort. More recently, the Lighthouse has seen the I-way bridge span being brought up to

Providence by barge and later, the wind turbines on their way to build the only offshore wind farm in the United States.

The Lighthouse itself has seen a vast difference in technology starting with lard oil to light the beacon transitioning to kerosene and later incandescent lamps when electricity was finally brought to the island in the mid-1950s. Today, the Lighthouse has the latest lighting technology by way of the LED beacon powered by solar panels. The heating of the Lighthouse has gone from coal stoves to kerosene stoves to

From 1871-1939, Pomham was manned by U. S. Lighthouse Service lightkeepers and their families, some serving for nearly 30 years. In 1939, U. S. Coast Guard personnel took the reins to finish out the "manned" years until the Lighthouse's automation and decommissioning in 1974. Civilian caretakers lived in the building until 1980, when the Lighthouse was finally abandoned. In 2004, Friends of Pomham Rocks Lighthouse was formed and began the long, arduous, and expensive process of restoring the very dilapidated lighthouse back to its former glory and beauty.



All our past and present members and supporters should be immensely proud of the part they have played and continue to play with the restoration and the ongoing care and maintenance of this beautifully restored lighthouse. Without your continued efforts and support, we would not be celebrating this momentous milestone - the 150<sup>th</sup> year anniversary of Pomham Rocks Lighthouse! I also recognize the remarkable dedication and efforts of our Board of Directors and past Chairmen. They all worked tirelessly to restore Pomham to its original condition.

In this very special 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary year, I cannot help but look back on my own personal involvement with Pomham Rocks Lighthouse. In 1971, the year of the Lighthouse's 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary, I reported to Pomham as a young Coast

Guardsman to start my over three-year tour there. I met my future wife there in Riverside and raised a family of three wonderful children. I eventually returned to Pomham in 2016 to resume my experiences there in time to have the privilege of being involved with the electrical and interior restorations. Today, as Chairman of the Board of Directors, I feel very honored to once again be charged with the care of the Lighthouse. To say the least, my years with Pomham Rocks has been a life-changing experience and it is a great privilege to continue caring for this historic landmark.

Please join us this year as we celebrate the remarkable history of the last surviving lighthouse on the Providence River. As described in this newsletter, we have several events planned to honor the Jubilee year of Pomham Rocks Lighthouse. It is our sincerest wish that you come and celebrate with us.
