John Hunt House Museum

We've continued to hold our monthly open houses on the 2nd Sunday of the month from 1-3:30. In addition to the tours of the museum, guided by our wonderful docents, we've had the 1:30 Hikes at Hunt's Mills, led by Ernie Germani and Alex Kemp. They meet at the Gazebo at 1:30 and walk the trails through the 44-acre property, describing many of the historical sites. For many of the summer months, we had the Rumford Junction Band playing in the Gazebo, making it feel like an old-fashioned Sunday afternoon.

We've also continued to feature 'Children's Day at the Museum' activities during our 2nd Sunday of the month Open Houses. Beverly Pettine leads interactive colonial activities in the Children's Room of the Museum from 1-2:30 and a Story Time at 2:30pm. 

Gardening Tips

- Divide spring blooming perennials like iris, lady's mantle, Brunnera, phlox and astilbe now for vigorous spring growth.
- Mowing over leaves before putting them in your compost will help them to break down faster.
- Do not prune evergreen shrubs in the fall. We prune at holiday time to have fresh greens for decorating.
 Prune evergreens in the spring so that new growth will be hardened off by next winter.
- For the holidays, stuff and bake sugar pumpkins for a festive meal. A friend shared Ghapama, an Armenian dish which is easy to make.
- Toast the seeds from your Halloween pumpkins! Look up Google, whats4eats, for the recipe.
- Now back to holiday greens and berries. Be creative and decorate your windows with baskets and decorate your mantels for a season long refreshing look!

Little Neck Cemetery War Memorials

If anyone is interested in colonial history forward this is the place! Little Neck Riverside, RI had its first burial in 1655!!!

Today, we are highlighting two war memorials at this cemetery.

The first is an engraved granite stone which measures 30" across X 43" high X 2.5" thick. This monument was given by The East Providence Bi-Centennial Committee in 1976 in grateful memory of 15 Patriots named below and those unknown interred in the Little Neck Cemetery who gave their lives to our country in the American Revolution.

The 2^{nd} memorial is placed next to the first.


The Granite Stone measures 41" across X 54" high X 2.75" thick. The bronze plaque measures 36" across X 50" high. There is a very prominent decorative motif casting of an Eagle perched upon a shield. It is a version of an American shield of that period. If one uses their imagination the red and white stripes would be in the lower 2/3 of the shield while the upper 1/3 would have white stars placed on a blue background.

This memorial honors the 804 citizens of EP who served our country in the First World War. The bottom half memorializes the 23 souls from EP that were lost in battle.

The 3rd photo is the two stones together.

Take a good look at all the information displayed in the signs in the 4th photo.

This is a new endeavor for us and we would welcome anyone with technical experience to help advise us!

1) Len lannacone Legacy Fund

We are thrilled to report that the East Providence Historical Society recently received \$100,000 from the estate of Len Jannacone. Len



was a long-time East Providence resident who passed away in January 2020, after a long illness. Len, a U.S. Army Veteran and career interior designer, was a prolific artist who created drawings and paintings of many historical sites in East Providence and throughout the state. One of his favorite subjects was the Hunt's Mills property and many of his creations are on display at the John Hunt House Museum.



Dave O'Connell, executor of the lannacone estate who facilitated the gift, said his dear friend wished to leave a gift for the National Parks Service and that the site of the John Hunt House Museum forms the southernmost point of interest of the Blackstone Valley National Heritage Corridor, part of the National Parks Service.

The funds, which are unrestricted, have been used to create an endowment in Len's name through the Rhode Island Foundation called the Len Iannacone Legacy Fund. The plan is to use some of the funds to purchase a new sign at the park's entrance to better attract visitors to the rich history the Hunt's Mills Heritage Park has to offer. We are extremely thankful for Len's gift. Through the Len Iannacone Legacy Fund, Len's gift will keep on giving for years to come.

"When a VIP agrees to share his talents, skills and interests with the National Park Service, he is paying us one of the highest compliments possible by offering a most valued possession his time."




