# ONCE IN A LIFETIME ART SALE

## "Spaces and Places in RI"

#### The Work of Len Iannacone and the Rhode Island He Loved

Once upon a time, there really was a little boy who grew up near Pierce Field in East Providence and whose mom took him to off to kindergarten in the fall of 1947. "Lenny," she said, "when the teacher calls Leonard Yannacone you have to answer "Here" and raise your hand." "But Mom, that's not my name. I'm Leonard Iannacone." (He stressed each syllable with the I sounding like an EE.) His mom replied, "When dad goes to work, he's Mr. Yannacone and when I go shopping I'm Mrs. Yannacone. That's just the way our name gets said here in America."

"There were lots of times I didn't raise my hand before I got used to being Len Yannacone," Lenny told me as we chatted over at Hunt's Mills in the early 1990's where volunteers were uncovering the history beneath the layers of linoleum, paneling, and paint in the Hunt House. Ginny Berwick and Edna Anness were two of his favorites. Len had traveled EP from top to bottom sketching and recording the places he loved. Then he branched out to the surrounding areas doing mostly pencil sketches. There are still some of those precious originals among this collection of his works for sale

Len grew up with art, music, basketball, golf and a little tennis. He had a flair, as they say, wearing raccoon coats in the winter, owning muscle cars, and framing his work in lavish colors. He tended to paint his oils as he saw them in his mind's eye. (Those tug boats are really red, not green, right?) After a stay in Las Vegas, Len returned home to his parents' house and bought himself a gallery on Warren Avenue. He spent the last years of his life among his "babies," the works he'd done as far back as the 70's. With a degree from RISD, his life's work was as an interior designer and draftsman, but for pleasure, he drew the historic places that he knew from growing up here: Pomham Light, the Indoor Court, Hunt House, the Horton Homestead in Seekonk, Down City scenes in the RISD area and much more. Anyone who knows RI will recognize scenes in Bristol, Newport and Narragansett.

So how did the Historical Society come to own this wonderful collection? Just life and one of it's quirky turns, perhaps. When Len returned to EP, he met David O'Connell who serves on the EP Arts Council. They hit it off and Len asked David to be his executor. David agreed, and after Len's death in Jan of 2020, when we had somewhat come out of hiding from Covid, David appeared at a summer Open House to let us know that Len had left the group \$5,000. We were thrilled! David warned us that there were many things to divest/sell so it would be a while before the check was "in the mail." One September day, David called to say that he had a buyer for the Gallery but it would need to be cleared by the following Wednesday. Would the HS accept Len's entire body of works to be sold at our discretion/profit? If so, could we get it all out of the gallery by that next Wednesday? We checked with Joyce May at the Weaver and asked if the library would like to split the profits on a sale at the library the next March. She totally agreed to come in on that project IF the library could be open. We packed the Caravan and took the load off to a Board member's basement, telling her that she would be rid of everything come spring. You know the story from there!

So, over two years later, with things just getting back to normal for us, we have decided to use Hunt's Mills for the opening sale of Len's work and a final sale at the Weaver Library. We think he would be pleased. Whenever we have found a picture which needed to hang at it's original location, i.e. Pomham Light, the Indoor Tennis Court, the John Hunt House, we have donated those works in his memory. But we knew that the community should have a chance to own these pictures also. This is the perfect time to furnish an office/business with local art at reasonable prices. The Weaver Library and the Arts Council are still our partners in getting these works onto your walls. We've had lots of help and advice from Luke MacInnis at "Frames of Mind" in Seekonk and the catalog will give you a great idea of what's available. But you need to see these pictures in person at Hunt's or at the Weaver Library (there are more than 130 pieces in all.) Perhaps you'll get a hefty coupon or a special deal! There will be a retrospective of Len's life showing at both sales and we hope you will help celebrate his generosity of spirit and talent with the Historical Society, the Libraries, and the Arts Council.




# Gardening Tips

- With the huge drought during July and August, many trees and perennials have suffered. Drought stress is serious. When allowed, water trees and perennials before late fall to help root growth and reduce winter burn.
- A water saving tip we have adopted this year, is to leave a 1/2 gallon jug handy by the kitchen sink. We collect the cool water that comes from the faucet as you wait for it to get hot. We use that jug to hand water heat stressed plants, somewhere on the deck or property.
- Harvest herbs early in the day and use them fresh or dry them. Many herbs, like parsley, freeze well for use later in the year!
- Excess tomatoes and peppers freeze well for homegrown freshness in winter dishes and recipes. Whether you grow them yourself or get them from a local farmers' market, now is the time to freeze them!
- Save seeds from flowers and vegetables in a dark, cool, dry space which is rodent proof!
- Once the water bans are lifted, be sure to monitor rainfall. We will need one to 2 inches per week into the fall to save trees and perennials. Observe the stress level of your plants and act accordingly. This has been an extreme season of hot weather with little rain.
- Reevaluate your lawn this fall and your reseed if watering is allowed!! Seeding a lawn is best done in early fall as most weeds will not compete with grass seed at this time. In the spring, weeds will win out and be a challenge for your grass seed.
