
Gardening Tips

- Your lawn will thank you if you mulch most of the fallen leaves.
 Many mowers have a mulching feature.
- Many perennials and ornamental grasses provide seeds and shelter for overwintering local birds. They also look great with a light white blanket of snow! Cut them back next spring before new growth appears.
- Your Christmas cactus needs 12 to 14 hours of total darkness to form flower buds. Start NOW!!
- Remember to dig dahlias, gladiolus and other tender perennials just after our first killing frost! Also, mulch your roses after the ground begins to freeze to keep the roots cold and stable, and have less rodent damage.
- Allow your gardens to prepare for their long Winters nap!






Bruce's 1st book on the Riverside hotels has become a favorite gift for EP transplants. This book has even more photos and information. Ride around town with this book on the seat next to you!



State Preservation Grant

Earlier this year we received the good news that our grant proposal to the RI Historical Preservation & Heritage Commission was approved for \$26,865. The grant funds are being used to reglaze and paint windows in the John Hunt House Museum and to paint the Education Center. Over the summer, under the leadership of Paul Barnum, Buildings Chair, we have been sending out Requests for Proposals (RFP's) and receiving bids from companies to perform the work.

Strategic Plan

In 2018 we developed our first three-year Strategic Plan. We developed it based on three focus groups with the community, and several meetings of the full board led by David Karoff. This fall we reviewed progress we've made against the goals and strategies that we had identified in five priority areas. The priority areas were

- Expand internal organizational capacity;
- 2. Increase funding base;
- 3. Increase partnerships with other organizations;
- 4. Expand education programming;
- 5. Maximize use of technology

We are proud to report that despite the many setbacks from COVID-19, we were able to accomplish most of our goals. This fall, the board has been meeting to develop an updated three-year Strategic Plan which will take us from January 1, 2023 to December 31, 2025.


A Legacy Well Placed

As of Oct. 7th, Len lannacone's body of art works has been spread throughout the area, into Seekonk and Rehoboth. Most pieces were sold at the Hunt House/Weaver sales but thirty pieces have gone to museums, libraries, preservation groups, and 2 local sports venues. We could not have done this sale/dispersal without the help of Ryan MacAuley of the Library staff and the Friends of the Library. Help from Luke McInnis at "Frames of Mind" was invaluable. If you use his shop, please convey your thanks. Our own group of volunteers did double duty as Open House docents and salespeople - some even worked the Looff teaser and the Weaver event! Thank you, all! Dual members of the Library Friends and the EPHS, Rose Marie Sirenski and Sharon DuBois were point people for the Library Sale. Dot Thornley kept those pictures safe at her house for two years and handled the financial end of the sale. She reports that we took in \$2,227.86 which will be shared by the HS, the Library and the Arts Council which gave us prime space at the Looff Festival. But the number of friends we have made over the Fall as we met people who wanted to know more about Len and how this sale came about is the real bonus. Now many of us have an lannacone original to remind us of this very rare event.

Newman Church Service/Sowams 17th Century Marker: A Blessed Event

In the last issue, you were treated to a picture of the Sowams Heritage Area marker which was dedicated on Sunday, Oct. 2 at the Newman Cemetery entrance on Newman Avenue. For those who were able to attend, it was an inspiring and transcendent moment, both as a service and as we gathered outside at the marker. The Pokanoket Tribe and the Newman choir provided music for the morning and both felt just right for the occasion. Newman Church places great emphasis on its racial justice efforts and wishes to acknowledge the truth of its history with the Pokanoket Tribe and, moving forward, to help them preserve their culture in the land their ancestors called Sowams.


