RI Audubon Society continues to spotlight birding at Hunt's Mills: Reserve your "spot" now!

Join Lauren Parmelee, Audubon's senior director of education, for an early morning bird walk at the historic Hunt's Mills property in East Providence. Located along the Ten Mile River, this lovely park has big trees, gardens and a nature trail. We will look for resident and migrating songbirds, as well as water birds in the river. Bring binoculars and wear sturdy walking shoes. Extra binoculars will be available. Advance registration required. Walks are weather dependent.

Gardening Tips

• Late winter is a great time to plan your garden and line up seeds that you may want to start indoors. Always check the package of each individual variety to determine when to start them. I always recommend a

sterile seed starting mix. Regular garden soil is too dense for many seedlings to do well.



- Now is a good time to start seeds, such as onions, shallots, leeks, and leafy greens, like lettuce, chard, and brassicas. These will be ready to transplant in late March to early April. You will want to harden them off for a week or so before transplanting by leaving them out during the day and bringing them in at night. Cover them at night if nighttime temperatures fall below 25 to 28 degrees.
- If you have left ornamental grasses for winter interest, sheer them to about a few inches above the plant crown before new growth begins. You can cut up the stalks for mulch in walkways of your garden.
- When the ground is thawed, check your perennials to see if they have heaved up out of place. Gently push them back down into the soil. This is caused by the crazy weather temperature swings we have had this winter. Your goal should be to mulch these plants in late fall, including roses, to keep them frozen and not breaking dormancy when we get warm days until early spring. The temperature swings can kill many perennials, so be on the lookout.

Blackstone River Valley National Heritage Corridor Awards

On December 15, Pat Anthony, Paul Barnum, Cheryl Faria and Jeff Faria, attended a meeting at the headquarters of the Blackstone River Valley National Heritage Corridor in Whitinsville, MA. We were honored to receive three awards for our



volunteer efforts. We received two Certificates of Appreciation for 5 years of volunteer service - one for Nancy Moore and one for the EP Historical Society. And we received the coveted Partner of the Year Award.

State Preservation Grant

Last year we received a grant from the RI Historical Preservation & Heritage Commission for some historical preservation projects. Under the leadership of Paul Barnum, Buildings Chair, we sent out Requests for Proposals (RFP's) and received bids from companies to



perform the work. In January of this year, Ned and Richard from Levine Painting reglazed and painted windows in the John Hunt House Museum. This spring we will be soliciting bids from companies to paint the Education Center.

Strategic Plan

In 2018 we developed our first three-year Strategic Plan. Last fall we updated it for another three years. We identified five priority areas which are:

- 1.) Expand internal organizational capacity
- 2.) Maintain financial stability
- 3.) Continue partnering with other organizations
- 4.) Expand education programming
- 5.) Maximize use of technology
