The India Point Railroad Bridge is no more!



Through the efforts of Council President Rodericks and our Federal elected officials, the last half of the swing bridge connecting Providence to East Providence over the Seekonk River was barged away in April to the scrap metal heap on Allen's Avenue. The original bridge was a covered wooden bridge and this iron version was abandoned in 1974.

The postcard view on top shows the open swing bridge followed by the 2004 snapshot showing the remaining sections after the removal of the swing bridge. The current view was taken from the same location.

author and historian Marty Podskoch who will give a Power Point presentation on the 90th Anniversary of the Civilian Conservation Corps Camps and work in RI.

The Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) began on March 31, 1933 under President Roosevelt's "New Deal" to relieve the poverty and unemployment of the Depression. CCC camps were set up in a few Rhode Island towns, state parks, and forests. Workers built trails, roads, campsites, and dams, stocked fish, built and maintained fire tower observer's cabins and telephone lines, fought fires, and planted millions of trees. The CCC disbanded in 1942 due to the need for men in WW II.

In Rhode Island seven CCC camps were established: Westerly/Burlingame in Charlestown, Greene/Mt. Vernon in Foster, Hope Valley/Arcadia in Richmond,

Putnam/ Washington State Park in Glocester, Kent/Nooseneck in West Greenwich, Escoheag/Beach Pond in Exeter, and Woonsocket/Primrose in North Smithfield.



During the summer of 1935 the Woonsocket/Primrose camp enrollees lived in Army tents in in North Smithfield, RI. These enrollees are waiting in the chow line with their mess kits for supper.


Learn More About EP Veterans Who Have War Memorials

Have you ever stood before any war memorial, read the plaque, and wanted to know more about the life of the veteran honored?

Now available, a new book entitled "Veterans With Individual War Memorials in E. Providence, RI" provides more details. It was written by some of the veterans' relatives and the EPVMER Committee to document these veterans' lives so their military efforts are not forgotten.

Susan Cady compiled many facts from original documents, newspaper articles found in scrapbooks, expressway bridge nomination letters, web sites, and family military documents. This book provides a glimpse of the lives of veterans who gave the ultimate sacrifice to our country. Also gives photos, the location, and details about the war monument's dedication ceremony.



Available now as an in library, educational reference, this collection of biographies is available at the Weaver Memorial Library (in the vertical files currently housed on the shelves with the RI Collection), and at the Riverside Library (in the Reference Collection), or ask at either library's service desk for help to locate this 120 page book. Also found in Adams Library at Rhode Island College (RI Collection in Special Collections) and at the EP Historical Society's Education Center. Copies exist

in the libraries at East Providence High School, Martin Middle School, and in the Alumni Office at Saint Raphael Academy in Pawtucket, for their students to read as many of our high school students and junior high school graduates served in these wars.

Details about the 76 EP High School war heroes and the others named on the "4 Wars Memorial" in the EP City Hall Plaza are posted on the EP Military Service Honor Roll. This can be found on paper at the EP Historical Society's Education Center and on the EPVMER website.

Gardening Tips

- Once spring flowering shrub blooms are spent, it usually is the best to prune them.
- Allow tulips, iris, and other spring bulbs the time to allow their long leaves to energize the bulbs for next season. Do not cut them back or snap them out too early.
- Add annuals to your perennial gardens to provide color all season long.
- In your vegetable garden, you can thin carrots and many leafy greens to about 2 inches apart. These young seedlings are edible and delicious. Try them in different culinary dishes!
- The male flowers of pumpkin and squash plants make great stuffed, fried blossoms! They are best to pick early in the morning and remove the stamen from the center of the flower! Search many recipes!!
- The male flower emerges earlier than the female by a week or so. The female flower has a small bulb at the base which will become fertilized when a pollinator travels from the male to the female. Leave the females on for fruiting/pollination! Stuffed squash flowers are an early summer delight!

I stuff them and fry/sauté them for about one to two minutes on each side, depending on the density of the stuffing mix!!



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
