We'll celebrate with hot dogs, hamburgers, salads, beverages AND strawberry shortcake. (cream donated by **Munroe Dairy**.)


The **Telephone Committee** will call the membership for reservations, (to be paid at the door) salads and 'Rumford' baking powder biscuits.

Preservation Report

The East Providence Historic Properties Study Commission held a meeting several weeks ago at Grace Chapel, Roger Williams Avenue, with residents of the Phillipsdale area to determine if there was an interest in having the area declared a historic district. A slide show of the area was presented and a discussion followed regarding the pros and cons of such a designation.

A later meeting was held at Grace Chapel on May 25. Representatives from Washington, DC, Cambridge, MA and state and city officials met with residents. The discussion centered on creating a 'walkable' area after a presentation about similar projects around the country. Many ideas surfaced for improving Roger Williams Avenue such as better sidewalks, alternating on-street parking, 'round abouts', trees, and constructing a waterfront drive to eliminate trucks on Roger Williams Avenue. Future meetings will be held in the fall to continue to involve the residents.

The Properties Commission is moving to obtain grant money to hire a consultant to apply to Washington, DC to designate the Phillipsdale area a national historic district.

The properties commission believes that East Providence needs a **demolition delay ordinance** to **protect historic properties** from being demolished before an effort has been made to save them. The commission is studying different ordinances in cities and towns in Rhode Island and Massachusetts.

The city of East Providence has set aside \$30,000 to restore the **Brown Williams cottage**, Hunts Mills Road. There is some evidence that the cottage may date back to 1710.

The historical society is looking to obtain grant money from the Blackstone River Valley National Heritage Corridor Commission to develop a master plan for the Hunts Mills area.

A Great Little Car

In the summer of 1941, I bought a neat 1931 model A Ford Roadster for twenty dollars. I earned the money by caddying at Wannamoisett Country Club. I knew my Ford would open many new and interesting opportunities for me and many East Providence High School friends. My brother-in-law said I paid too much for my car. He had bought a beautiful battleship grey, 1932 Ford convertible for eight dollars. My roadster had a roof that would go up or down but differed from a convertible in that there were side curtains that had to be attached if rain or snow or other inclement weather was coming. Roadsters have not been made since 1937.

Twenty dollars in 1941 is not the same as twenty dollars in 2004 but it is not possible to buy a nice car for anything approaching the price I paid in 1941 for that two-tone roadster. Later in the war years, when gas rationing began, I found that my Ford would go along good on kerosene or even turpentine if gasoline was not available. Try that with a modern car!

In August 1943, I went out to the garage to place my Ford on blocks when I was called into the army. Dad stopped by and asked me what I was doing. I told him that I was putting my roadster on blocks so that when the war was over I would have a car to run around in. Pop put a stop to my idea. "You can't leave that ash can in the garage until you come home. That might not be for years," he said. Reluctantly, I sold my Ford to Warren Lundgren for twenty-five dollars.

I didn't know it then but soon after I went into the army, Dad bought a horse. He named it Buster and placed it in his garage where my roadster had been. He needed a diversion what with all three of his sons now in the army.
